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MINISTERS MESSAGE

'Tis a season of incredible change at TSA and throughout the United Church of Canada. Let's start with the changes at TSA:

We have spruced up the Narthex! (That's the entry way off Plaunt before you enter the sanctuary.) The historical display has been moved into the chapel. Our Statement of Purpose has been stenciled onto the wall. A beautiful table has been placed in the narthex to display information. A new pamphlet and magazine rack is up. Two chairs have been added to make the space more inviting. Combined with the automatic door openers and outdoor signage the place is looking great.

Less visible changes include improvements to our accounting so that future reports to council and the congregation will be more transparent and easy to understand.

We have a team working on how we will provide faith formation to the community in the future. As you will have noticed attendance in programs such as Godly Play has been in decline and we want to make sure that we are providing opportunities for people of all ages to explore their spirituality.

Now, in the denomination the changes we talked about last year are coming into effect this January. Presbytery and Conference are being eliminated. We will be part of a new region and the region will help us to set goals and live intentionally as a ministry of the United Church. Pastoral Relations processes will change (that's how you hire a new minister). Many such tasks will be done on line and through a central national office. We will support the national office through a new assessment that will cost TSA approximately \$10,000 per year. This is close to the amount we have given in past years to run the Presbytery and Conference system.

All of this is being done to streamline the denomination in an age of fewer volunteers and less money. The changes are designed to save the national church \$17 million a year. TSA will be selecting a lay representative to the region soon and that person will keep us abreast of the changes.



MISSION AND SERVICE

The Mission and Service Fund of the United Church of Canada is the primary way in which our denomination shares God's love and justice in the world. The Mission and Service Fund funds projects around the world from soup kitchens in downtown Toronto to farming projects in Haiti.

The fund raises approximately 30 million dollars each year and our own congregation contributes approximately \$30,000 annually.

Contributors to TSA designate what amount of their giving's they want to send to M&S. Check our progress on the banner in the narthex.

The UCW adds around \$4000 annually to these gifts.

A significant change is taking place this January as the United Church of Canada changes its polity. As of January 2019, 100% of monies given to M&S will go to ministry projects. No money will be spent on administration or church governance.

Each week in the bulletin we tell the story of one project of the Mission and Service Fund. Hopefully you gain a sense of the scope of this work as you read these Minutes for Mission. Other ways to find out more about Mission and Service is to go to YouTube to the United Church's channel. There are many videos about our work. You can also go to united-church.ca to learn more (Look under "social justice").

FROM THE DESK OF CHAIR OF COUNCIL



Council has been working to meet the goals established for 2018-19, which are aligned with our Statement of Purpose. Considerable progress has been made towards each of our six goals:

1. *... to move towards a more sustainable future.* We have met with Admaston representatives to share insights on issues of aging congregations and building maintenance and costs. We have increased the permanent space used by the Robbie Dean Centre, made office space available to Rev. Sheryl McLeod, minister of the Admaston Pastoral Charge, and opened up the Godly Play room and a lower storage room for meetings. We have established a Property Reserve Fund and a Human Resources Reserve Fund to help offset unforeseen or large expenses in those areas.
2. *... to complete the Affirming Process.* A vote on whether or not to become an Affirming Ministry will be held on October 21st. Each week an article in support of this process, written by a member of the congregation has been published in the bulletin. In addition, our affirming team met with Perth and Smiths Falls churches for discussions. A guest speaker has been invited for September 16.
3. *... to improve building accessibility.* A government grant was received and work to add power assists to the Quarry St. entrance is underway.
4. *... to produce statements that clarify roles in the community.* We have established a Behavioural Covenant, updated our Wedding Policy and Funeral Policy and drafted a Baptismal Policy for approval in the fall.
5. *... to improve communication* with the congregation.. We are providing more updates in the bulletin to help keep the congregation informed of activities and decisions.
6. *.... to update the physical appearance of our building with a specific focus on the narthex and exterior signage.* We have accomplished a lot in this area. A welcome banner was put up outside, the TSA sign was updated, the pillars and light posts were painted to better match the brick of the church and the door handles were polished. We moved the heritage display cabinets and pictures into the chapel to create a new heritage area. Chairs have been put in the Narthex to welcome people to sit in that area. Our Statement of Purpose has been posted on the wall so that it is easy to read as you leave the Sanctuary. Beside the Statement of Purpose a table displays our programs, activities and passions.

We welcome your feedback on progress to date.

PROPERTY

Progress is being made and hopefully by October we will have new doors in place at the Quarry St. Entrance. This will make our building fully accessible on both floors. This project will be fully funded by the grant received earlier this year. We have also had approval to replace the heating unit by the parking lot door and upgrade the hot water heater with a hot water on demand system. Both of these units were overdue for an upgrade. A new emergency lighting unit was required and has been replaced. The wall on the back left side of the sanctuary was repaired with new gyp rock and foam insulation was added. Our ageing building with its heavy usage is constantly requiring repairs. Your support for these and future project is well appreciated.

FOODGRAINS GARDEN



Weeks of high summer temperatures and unusually low precipitation presented challenges for our garden and made us mindful of the problems faced by small scale farmers whose one or two acre plot is their sole source of food.

The conservation agriculture techniques of planting close together and applying a thick mulch of straw in June helped most of the plants to survive. While we have not had a bountiful harvest like last year, fortunately we have had some peppers, cucumbers, tomatoes, beans, onions, parsley and basil to share. We expect that our tomato, kale and red cabbage will be satisfactory.

Questions and requests for taste testing have made for interesting conversations.

Canadian Foodgrains Bank – icare Campaign

We think Canada can (and should!) play a bigger role in helping to fight world poverty and hunger.

Here's why:

- **Canada is a wealthy country, with much to share.** Canada currently provides about **\$5 billion** a year toward helping to address world poverty. That's about **0.26 percent** of our national income (OECD) and about 1.7% of our overall budget. It sounds like a lot of money—and it is. But think of it this way: Canada's defense budget is about \$20 billion a year. We spend \$6.5 billion on our pets every year. And we spend \$22 billion on alcohol each year.
- **Canada can demonstrate global leadership by increasing the amount it spends on international aid.** Canada lags behind other developed countries in our development spending. Other countries give a lot more. The United Kingdom, Norway and Germany all give over **0.7 percent** of their national income, for example.
- **It helps us, too.** Helping people in other countries climb out of poverty contributes to a more stable, prosperous and hopeful world—and this benefits us all.
- **For people of faith, it's what we're called to do.** In scripture, we are called to love our neighbours. *For when I was hungry, you gave me something to eat...Matthew 25:35.* It's also what we aspire to be as Canadians—compassionate and generous.
- Canadian Foodgrains Bank has launched the "I Care" campaign to help us demonstrate to the government that Canadians care about ending global poverty and hunger.

We want as many Canadians as possible to sign one of our "I Care" postcards to let the Prime Minister know that when it comes to ending global poverty and hunger, they care! So, at many Canadian churches, festivals, agricultural fairs, and public events this summer and fall, there will be opportunity to sign postcards. These cards will be collected in specially marked grain sacks to be presented to the Prime Minister on World Food Day, October 16th, on Parliament Hill.



The **Use of Facilities Committee** would like to remind you that our building is used by many, many varied groups and we appreciate your welcoming them and being considerate of their needs. In view of recent security issues, with doors being left open etc, please be sure to close all outside doors, as we do not want to encourage those who do not have legitimate business. Net sales in Q2 were up \$1,851.17 from Q2 last year with 1 fewer day open in 2018. Total given to the Church for the year 2018 is \$20,200 which is \$2,100 more than budgeted.
